



THAT'S A WRAP!

— CONVERSATION STARTERS —

The questions on the next page are designed to encourage deep thinking, reflection and open-ended discussions about "That's A Wrap!" themes.

Problem-Solving and Critical Thinking:

- What kinds of clues or riddles did Jonathan and Redge face in the mummy's maze? How did they figure out the solutions?
- If you were in the maze with Jonathan and Redge, what strategy would you use to escape?
- The mummy set up tricky challenges—do you think he was being fair? Why or why not?
- What would you do differently if you had to create your own maze challenge?

Imagination and Creativity:

- What did the Tomb of the Tones look like in your mind? Can you describe or draw it?
- If you could add your own creature or character to this episode, what would they be like, and what would their role be?
- The mummy was wrapped up in mystery and riddles—if you could create a different version of the mummy, what would their game show be about?

Friendship and Teamwork:

- How did Jonathan and Redge work together to solve the mummy's riddles? What strengths did each character bring to the team?
- Can you think of a time when you worked with a friend to solve a problem or overcome a challenge? How did it feel to work together?
- What do you think would have happened if Jonathan and Redge didn't work as a team? Could they have escaped on their own?

Character Reflection and Growth:

- How did the mummy's character change throughout the episode? Do you think he learned anything from Jonathan and Redge?
- What did Jonathan and Redge learn from their adventure in the mummy's maze? How might they act differently next time?
- Was there a part of the episode that reminded you of something you've experienced? How did that experience help you grow or learn something new?

Applying the Lessons in Real Life:

- The episode teaches us that riddles and challenges aren't just about winning but learning along the way. How can you apply this idea to challenges you face in school or at home?
- Jonathan and Redge needed both patience and creativity to escape. Can you think of a time when you used these skills in your own life?
- The story shows that sometimes things that seem scary at first aren't so bad once you understand them. Can you think of an example where you realized something wasn't as scary as you thought?
